The music heard on the tape part of this piece is taken from the collection *Sacred Harp Singing*, recorded at the Alabama Sacred Harp convention in 1942 by Alan Lomax and George Pullen Jackson, and released by the Archive of Folk Culture, Library of Congress (AFS L11). The tune "Wondrous Love" continues to be a popular hymn in many American Protestant denominations. The words are attributed to Alexander Means and the music was arranged by William Walker, though the tune itself is a traditional ballad from the British Isles. This version of the hymn first appeared in The Southern Harmony and Musical Companion, published in 1835.
